



## LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

### Introduction and Background

As announced in the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE)'s [April 28, 2021 broadcast](#), in March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal [American Rescue Plan \(ARP\) Act](#), Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families. Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in [Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register](#) by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Pursuant to those requirements, **LEAs must submit to the NJDOE and post on their website their Safe Return Plans by June 24, 2021.** The NJDOE intends to make LEA ARP ESSER Fund applications available in EWEG on May 24, 2021 and LEAs will submit their Safe Return Plans to the NJDOE via EWEG. To assist LEAs with the development of their Safe Return Plans, the NJDOE is providing the following template.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan. The questions in the template below will be included in the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG. LEAs will submit responses to the questions within the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE hopes that this template will allow LEAs to effectively plan for that submission and to easily post the information to their websites as required by the ARP Act.

Note that on May 17, 2021, Governor Murphy [announced](#) that upon the conclusion of the 2020-2021 school year, portions of Executive Order 175 allowing remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as they were prior to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The NJDOE and New Jersey Department of Health will share additional information regarding State requirements or guidance for health and safety protocols as it becomes available.

**Vaccination:** As per EO 253 Lopatcong Township School District staff and personnel will be required to fully vaccinated and present proof to the district by or must undergo regular testing for COVID-19 throughout the school year

**Travel:** Lopatcong School District will follow the CDC Guidelines for travel.

After you travel:

- [Get tested](#) with a [viral test](#) 3-5 days after travel AND stay home and self-quarantine for a full 7 days after travel.
  - Even if you test negative, stay home and self-quarantine for the full 7 days.
  - If your test is positive, [isolate](#) yourself to protect others from getting infected.
- If you don't get tested, stay home and self-quarantine for 10 days after travel.
- Avoid being around people who are at [increased risk for severe illness](#) for 14 days, whether you get tested or not.
- Self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms; isolate and get tested if you develop symptoms.

Vaccinated students and staff returning from domestic travel, are not required to quarantine upon return but should self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms and isolate and get tested if they develop. **If returning from international travel, vaccinated persons follow the testing and quarantine guidelines stated above.**

## 1. Maintaining Health and Safety

For each mitigation strategy listed below (A–H), please describe how the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policies, on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC.

A. Universal and correct wearing of masks:

The Lopatcong Township School District will allow for the optional wearing of masks for students and employees. The district will await specific guidance from the DOH or DOE in order to develop policies or procedures related to optional and situational wearing of masks.

B. Physical distancing- *only to be used in the event of a change in guidance from the DOE or DOH* (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding):

- a. The Lopatcong Township School District will provide as much social distancing as possible in classrooms, busses, common areas and outdoor space. We will consult with the Warrant County Department of Health and review guidance from the NJDOH and NJDOE.
- b. Every effort will be made to maintain proper physical distancing at the designated entrances. Both the Elementary School and the Middle School will provide signage to maintain proper social distancing during arrival, hallway passing times, use of common areas, and dismissal times.
- c. School protocols may include but are not limited to: appropriate signage on walls, one way hallways when possible, use of separate entrances for arrival and departure, limited and staggered passing times (when possible) and floor signage to remind student to remain socially distant when traveling between locations.
- d. The District will allow outside organizations to use facilities, following CDC Guidelines

C. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette

- a. Hand sanitizer (with at least 60% alcohol) will be located in
  - i. Every classroom
  - ii. At the entrances and exits of the buildings
  - iii. Outside the bathrooms
  - iv. In the lunchroom
  - v. In various locations in the hallways

1. Students will be asked to wash their hands for at least 20 second intervals before and after eating, after using the restroom, and after blowing their nose/coughing/sneezing.
  - b. Signs promoting proper handwashing are placed in every bathroom and throughout the school buildings to promote proper hygiene.
- D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation
- a. The District has developed and will maintain the schedule for cleaning and sanitizing the buildings
  - b. Use all cleaning products according to the directions on the label. For disinfection most common EPA-registered household disinfectants should be effective. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products (e.g., concentration, application method and contact time, etc.) Examples of frequently touched areas in schools:
    1. Classroom desks and chairs
    2. Lunchroom tables and chairs
    3. Door handles and push plates
    4. Handrails
    5. Kitchens and bathrooms Light switches
    6. Handles on equipment (e.g. athletic equipment)
    7. Buttons on vending machines and elevators
    8. Shared telephones
    9. Shared desktops
    10. Shared computer keyboards and mice
    11. Drinking fountains
  - c. Sanitize bathrooms daily, or between use as much as possible, using protocols outlined by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
  - d. The district will ensure that their indoor facilities have adequate ventilation which includes:
    - i. Recirculated air will have a fresh air component
    - ii. Window will be opened if A/C is not provided
    - iii. Filters for the A/C units will be maintained and changed according to the manufacturer recommendations.
  - e. The district has installed no-touch faucets
  - f. The district will remove all tops of garbage cans to limit contact
  - g. The district will have all bathroom doors propped open to limit contact
  - h. The drinking fountains will be limited to the new "bottle filling" stations. The district encourages staff and students to bring in their own water bottle and refill as needed at the designated stations. Bottled water will be available to those that are in need.

- i. Hand sanitizer will be made available at the entrance to each building and in each classroom, outside public bathrooms and office. There will also be hand sanitizers found throughout the hallways.
  - j. Schedule for routine cleaning and disinfecting of furniture has been developed for each building
  - k. Disposable wipes will be available to all staff to clean commonly used surfaces such as keyboards, desks, and remote controls before use.
  - l. The district will ensure adequate supplies to support cleaning and disinfection practices
  - m. Windows will be opened to increase air circulation, weather permitting
  - n. Internal classroom doors will be open to increase air circulation
  - o. Where deemed necessary, additional training will be provided to the custodial staff.
- E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health department
- a. The Lopatcong Township School District will continue to follow the contract tracing and quarantine recommendations of the Warren County Department of Health and the CDC.
  - b. Updates and changes to protocols will be communicated the community regularly.
- F. Diagnostic and screening testing
- a. The Lopatcong Township School District will continue to abide by the guidance set forth by the DOGH and/or the DOE for testing.
- G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible
- a. In collaboration with the Warren County Department of Health, the Lopatcong Township School District has assisted and will continue to assist educators, support staff, and students (if eligible) to schedule and obtain a COVID-19 vaccination. These appointments are made available at various local locations.
- H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies
- a. Reasonable accommodations will be provided for higher-risk students who have serious underlying medical conditions.
  - b. Confidential medical information must be provided to the school nurse, accompanied by a medical note from a licensed healthcare provider requesting accommodations.
  - c. The school physician will review such request and a determination will be made. If the request is approved, a plan will be developed to accommodate the needs of the student.
  - d. Masks will not be required if a student's documented medical condition, or disability as reflected in an Individual Education Program (IEP), precludes the use of a face covering.

## 2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

- The Lopatcong Township School District plans to return to pre-pandemic full day schedule. The district will follow all mandates put forward by the New Jersey Department of Education, the New Jersey Department of Health, the CDC and the Warren County Department of Health.
- Virtual Learning:
  - **Remote Instruction:** Remote instruction is no longer an option in New Jersey.
  - The District will ONLY be providing remote instruction for excluded students throughout the year. Students will be required to use Google Classroom and email participation in language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, in synchronous and asynchronous instruction sessions Health, Physical Education, Art and Music shall be asynchronously.
  - The Remote Students Code of Conduct shall be in place to ensure appropriate school behavior and use of district –provided materials and equipment
  - If quarantining of students is necessary, the district will utilize Google Classroom as an online platform.
  - Instruction for both virtual and in-person instruction will be taken daily and is mandatory.
  - The school schedule may be adjusted according to the guidance from the local health department and DOE
  - The educational program may be adjusted at any given time due to COVID-19 infection, rise, and local/state guidance.
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs of Students:
  - Continue with the designated District Wide SEL Program
  - Summer Transition Program

- Periodic Counseling when needed, provided by school social workers and guidance counselors
- Consultations may be requested with a behaviorist to develop and implement an intervention plan to support individual students
